**AUTISM: EMBRACE UNIQUENESS
FOSTER UNDERSTANDING**

The Coalition for Public Safety Training in School, Inc. (CPSTS) is in support of Eric Blessed Carpenter-Grantham, and the bill passing of Eric’s ID Law.

In the heart of Maryland, a young man named Eric Blessed Carpenter-Grantham was on a mission. At just 20 years old, he was not just a college student pursuing a dual degree in General Studies with a focus on Political Science and Media Production; he was also a passionate advocate for those with invisible disabilities like his own.

From an early age, Eric faced challenges that many could hardly fathom. Diagnosed as high-functioning autistic, he navigated a world that often misunderstood

him. His memories of bullying and isolation at school lingered, and a traumatic experience from his childhood, heart bypass surgery at just 11, shaped his resilience. As he grew older, the shame that once clouded his identity transformed into a proud acceptance of who he was.

Fueled by his experiences and the worries of his mother, Linda Carpenter-Grantham, Eric felt a stirring mission to create a safer environment for individuals with invisible disabilities. The catalyst for his advocacy came in the wake of George Floyd’s tragic death, which left a profound mark on society and prompted conversations about systemic issues, including those affecting marginalized communities. Linda’s fears for Eric’s safety only intensified with each news report, igniting a flame within him to instigate change.

Eric's ID Law was born. A proposed Maryland legislation that would allow individuals with invisible disabilities to voluntarily add a marker to their state ID. This small but significant symbol would signal to law enforcement and others that the person might need special assistance or understanding during interactions. Eric envisioned a future where individuals like himself would feel seen and protected, rather than judged or misunderstood.

With the support of his mother and a growing team of allies, Eric embarked on a journey that was both daunting and exhilarating. He passionately shared his story with anyone who would listen, attending community forums, reaching out to local politicians, and networking with organizations that championed disability rights. He spoke with raw honesty about his struggles and triumphs, framing his narrative not just as a personal battle, but as a broader call for empathy and awareness.



After relentless efforts, discussions, and negotiations, the moment finally arrived. On May 13, 2025, Governor Wes Moore signed Eric's ID Law into effect. The sense of triumph was overwhelming as Eric stood with his supporters, witnessing the fruit of his labor transform into reality. The law officially took effect on October 1st, and with it, the hope of safer, more inclusive interactions for countless Marylanders began to unfold.



As news of the law spread, there was a tangible excitement. Over 17,717 Marylanders proudly donned the ERIC's Butterfly Logo on their state IDs, a symbol of recognition and safety for those with invisible disabilities. Each badge represented a life touched by Eric's tireless fight.

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Each one is a testimony to his belief that everyone deserves understanding.

Reflecting on his journey, Eric felt a sense of fulfillment. What started as a young man's personal struggle had blossomed into a movement that empowered others. With gratitude in his heart, he continued to advocate for those who were often overlooked, reminding the world that strength lies in unity and that even the smallest voices can create monumental change.

Eric celebrates Autism Awareness Month every April with his Blue Runway Fashion Show sponsored by Macy's. Eric's models are from the autism and invisible disability communities, which truly marks a special moment. Eric is truly a hero! His passion, dedication, and unwavering support inspire everyone around him, proving that true beauty lies in authenticity and inclusion. As he takes to the stage each year, he not only showcases fashion but also fosters understanding and acceptance, lighting a path for others to follow. In this celebration of diversity, Eric reminds us all that we are stronger together, and every step taken on that runway paves the way for a brighter, more inclusive future for all.

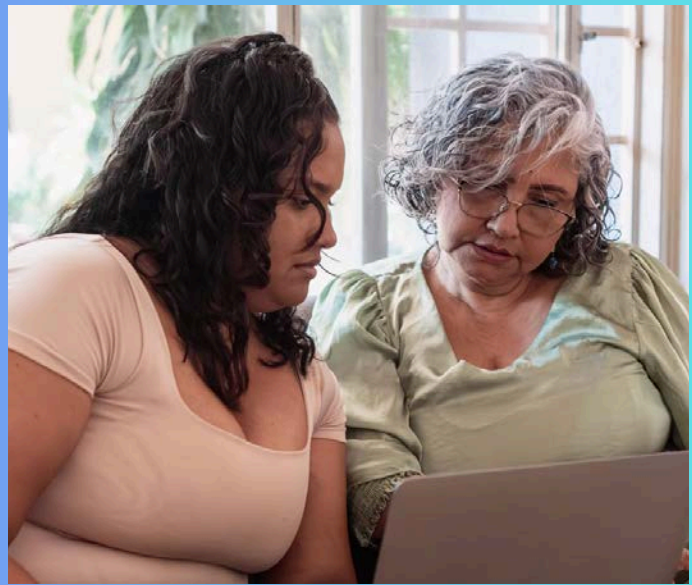
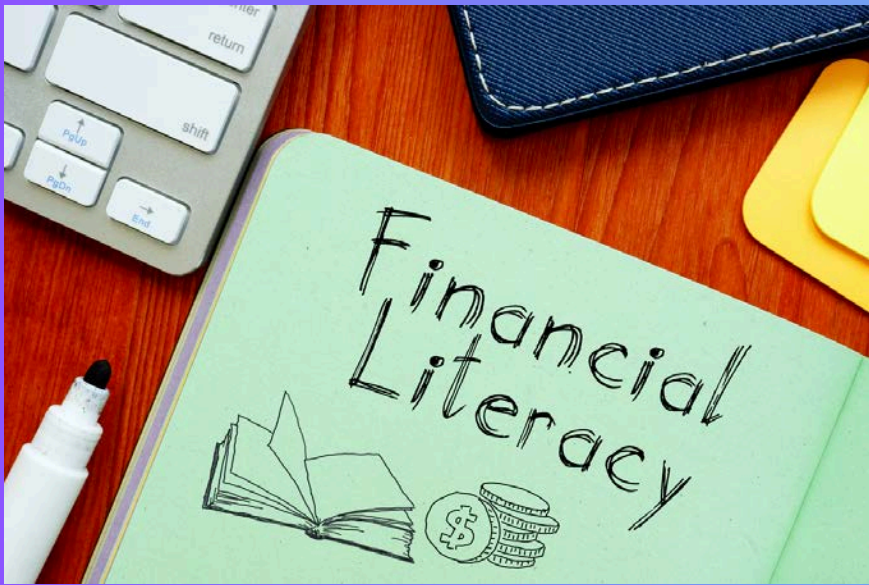

The day served as a reminder of the church’s ongoing commitment to uplifting the community, not just spiritually, but through meaningful outreach that brings people together in love and support.



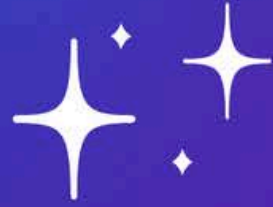

ON THE WATCH WITH CPSTS PUBLIC SAFETY TIPS

Identity Theft: Don't Be Fooled!

Identity theft is less about “hackers in hoodies” and more about everyday slips, lost mail, weak passwords, or a convincing phone call. The good news: a few consistent habits go a long way.

Protect your personal information:

- Don't share your Social Security number, banking info, or passwords unless you initiated the contact and trust the source.
- Shred documents with personal data before tossing them.
- Be cautious on social media, details like your birthday, school, or pet's name can be used to guess security questions.

Strengthen your accounts:

- Use strong, unique passwords for each account (a password manager helps).
- Turn on two-factor authentication (2FA) wherever possible.
- Avoid using public Wi-Fi for banking or shopping unless you're using a secure connection (like a VPN).

Watch out for scams:

- Be skeptical of urgent calls, texts, or emails claiming to be from banks, government agencies, or even family members.
- Don't click unknown links or download unexpected attachments.
- Remember: legitimate organizations won't pressure you for sensitive info on the spot.

Monitor your finances:

- Check bank and credit card statements regularly for unfamiliar charges.
- Review your credit report for free at AnnualCreditReport.com.
- Consider setting up account alerts for transactions.

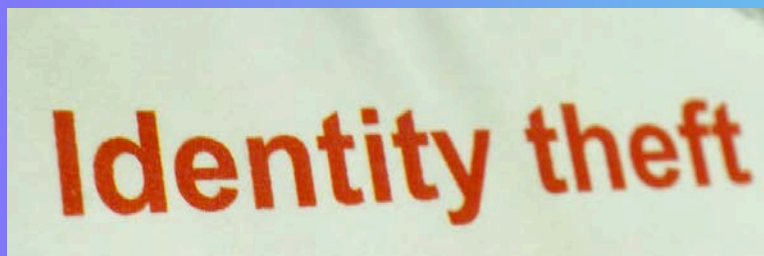
Add extra protection:

- Place a fraud alert or credit freeze with the major credit bureaus: Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion.
- Secure your mailbox, consider a locked box, or prompt mail pickup.

Protect your devices:

- Keep your phone and computer updated with the latest security patches.
- Install apps only from trusted sources and review permissions.

Bottom line: Stay alert, verify before you trust, and monitor regularly. Identity theft often succeeds because it catches people off guard. Your awareness is your first line of defense.

From the President's Desk

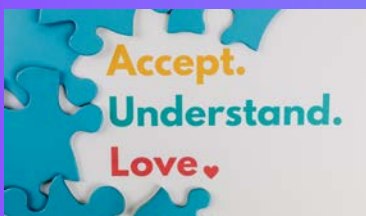
